

CHCT – who are we?


- Cornwall Historic Churches Trust
- Registered Charity formed in 1955
- Restoration and repair of churches or chapels with architectural or historical merit
- All denominations eligible





CHCT – who are we?


- Award 15 20 grants each year
- Grant value £250 to £10,000
- Also distribute funds on behalf of a number of other organisations such as the Duke of Cornwall Benevolent Fund and Cornwall Heritage Trust





CHCT – who are we?

- Run entirely by volunteers
- Variety of professional skills
- Visit every church
- Assess and report on need





CHCT – why do we do it?

Four-fifths of Cornish churches were built before 1550.

The Trust's foundation document states:

"The churches are still there, still praying through the storms and the rains. We must not let down the past which has loved and cared for them".





CHCT – why do we do it?

- Encourage appreciation of our heritage
- Make our buildings more attractive as places of worship
- Make our buildings better suited for community use
- Engage local communities
- Improve financial viability





How can we help?

Funds available for preservation and *maintenance*, improvement, upkeep, beautification and reconstruction of churches in Cornwall and of monuments, fittings, fixtures, stained glass, furniture, ornaments and chattels in churches and churchyards.





How can we help?

- "Churches" are defined as Christian places of worship of any age in current use. If your church is in need of restoration or repair, we may be able to help.
- Experience has shown that our support can be useful when seeking grants elsewhere.

We have three types of grant....

- Restoration and Repair Grants
- Smaller Project Grants
- Maintenance and Kickstart Grants



Restoration & Repair Grants



Our Trust Deed states that our funds be used for: the preservation and maintenance, improvement, upkeep, beautification and reconstruction of churches in Cornwall and of monuments, fittings, fixtures, stained glass, furniture, ornaments and chattels in churches and churchyards.

Restoration & Repair Grants



- We prioritise our activities to structural work on roofs and rainwater goods, followed by electrical safety and heating systems.
- We also support work on windows, monuments, bells, paintings, organs and clocks.
- Minimum grant size is £250, the maximum is £5,000, or £10,000 for Church Friends.

Restoration & Repair Grants



- We do not usually support new build work, kitchens and toilets, or re-ordering.
- We do not provide funding for boundary walls unless they form part of the church building itself.
- We do not fund car parks.

Grants for Smaller Projects



- Smaller projects that fall outside the scope of regular maintenance.
- Urgent repairs.
- CHCT will offer grants of £1,000 or 25% of the cost of the scheme before VAT, whichever is less. The minimum grant size is £250. VAT may be reclaimable under LPWS.

Grants for Smaller Projects



- The work MUST have been identified by QI report or report by regular maintenance contractor / builder;
- Two quotes for the work must have been obtained;
- Work costs between £1,000 and £10,000 before
 VAT
- Confirmation that the work does not require a faculty or similar permission.

Grants for a Hostile Climate - Maintenance and Kickstart Scheme for 2025



- •£10,000 set aside for 2025
- Essential maintenance
- Start up cost, eg surveys
- Grants of up to £500 per church
- First come, first served basis





Only available to Church Friends of CHCT.

The Scheme can be withdrawn at any time, without notice.

Each church can only apply once for one of the grants described above.

Churches that have received Maintenance Inspection grants in the past are not eligible to apply for the Maintenance grants in this scheme.

We reserve the right to refuse applications that do not meet our criteria.

Please note, costs incurred in engaging a professional fund raiser are not eligible.

Retrospective applications for Kickstart grants will not be accepted.

What happens after you apply?

- Normally your Church will be visited by one or two members of the CHCT Executive Committee.
- Applications for Restoration & Repair Grants are considered at the quarterly trustee meetings.
- Decisions for other grants are made after assessment visits (Smaller Projects) or on receipt of correct paperwork (Maintenance / Kickstart grants)
