The charity assists Mothers-to-be and New Mothers with advice, information, friendship, baby goods, financial help, moral support and accommodation as appropriate to their needs and according to the resources the charity has available. Its main outreach is by providing funding to groups that provide these services, although the Guild also makes grants to individuals, where appropriate. The charity particularly supports groups which strive to reach out to expectant Mothers in Crisis who feel under any kind of pressure during their pregnancy.

The Guild also exists to provide information, support and help to women experiencing a difficult time in their pregnancies and to those with children, particularly newly born children, who are facing hardships.
