Arts Council National Lottery Project Grants

Arts Council National Lottery Project Grants up to £100,000 for not-for-profits in England focused on the arts, museums and libraries projects. The programme sets out to achieve ACE's mission, 'great art and culture for everyone'. Project Grants supports a broad range of not-for-profit projects that create new work and sustain quality to help new audiences across England to engage with arts and culture. Applications must include at least 10% partnership funding from sources other than the Arts Council. Decisions on applications for £15,000 or less take six weeks. Decisions on applications for over £15,000 take 12 weeks.

Barclays Community Football Fund and the Sported Foundation

Grants of £1,000 to make playing football more accessible at grassroots level for underrepresented groups, including girls, young people from disadvantaged backgrounds and young people with a disability.

Community organisations that are keen to offer football and want to expand their existing provision to new audiences, as well as organisations that are already delivering football to under-represented groups are encouraged to apply. The engagement should be focused on including and inspiring girls and young people from lower socio-economic and under-represented groups, including culturally diverse communities, young people with disabilities, and young people from the LGBTQ+ community.

The Central Social and Recreational Trust www.csrt.info

The Central Social and Recreational Trust aims to improve the conditions of boys and girls in England under the age of 21 and of all other persons by reasons of their poverty who would otherwise be unable to obtain facilities for recreational or other leisure time occupations.

They can help fund equipment, maintenance of properties, training. Grants up to £1,500 and applications can be made any time.

The Coral Samuel Charitable Trust

Grants generally up to £5,000 are available to UK registered charities for general charitable purposes. A family-based grant-making charity, it tends to demonstrate a preference for supporting UK registered charities working in the areas of:

- o Animal welfare
- o Education

- o Culture
- o Medical causes
- o Social welfare

The Young & Talented Cornwall Creative Writing Award aims to support and encourage young writers in Cornwall, between the ages of 16 and 23. They are especially hoping to support those from disadvantaged and challenging backgrounds. The award will be a mix of both mentoring with an established writer based in Cornwall (face-to-face sessions supported by email contact) and a cash award of up to £1,000 together with a reading award of £150 worth of books. The mentoring support is offered for a period of up to a year.

The Elmgrant Trust awards small grants (around £550) to voluntary and community organisations in the South West of England for projects that improve the lives of local people, particularly through education, the arts and social sciences.

Grant awards can cover core running costs or project costs of small, established organisations. Although the Trust will fund across the South West, it favours projects in Devon and Cornwall.

The board of trustees meet three times a year, usually on the last Saturday of February, June and October. Apply by sending an application letter by post.

The Radcliffe Trust support two funding schemes:

- Heritage and Crafts: supports the development of the skills, knowledge and experience that underpin the UK's traditional cultural heritage and crafts sectors. This includes support for: craft and conservation training; practical projects, particularly those that include a strong training element; strategic and capacity-building projects which demonstrate clear benefits to the sector; Special Needs projects whose emphasis is on skills development.
- Music: supports classical music performance and training, especially chamber music, composition and music education. Particular interests within music education are music for children and adults with special needs, youth orchestras and projects at secondary and higher levels, including academic research.

Donations are generally targeted sums for specific projects or initiatives rather than to support general expenditure. The Foundation welcomes appeals from smaller specialist charities where a relatively small grant can make a real difference.

Grants of between £2,000 and £5,000 for UK registered charities particularly in the South-West and in the fields of welfare, children, education, medicine, music and the arts.

Grants can be awarded for a period of up to 3 consecutive years.

* The Trustees prioritise charities that the Weinstock Fund has supported historically. An application by a charity not benefitted by the Weinstock Fund since 2018 is unlikely to succeed. Eligible applicants should submit their application at least 6 months before their project is scheduled to commence.
