Arts Council National Lottery Project Grants up to £100,000 for not-for-profits in England focused on the arts, museums and libraries projects. The programme sets out to achieve ACE's mission, 'great art and culture for everyone'. Project Grants supports a broad range of not-for-profit projects that create new work and sustain quality to help new audiences across England to engage with arts and culture. Applications must include at least 10% partnership funding from sources other than the Arts Council. Decisions on applications for £15,000 or less take six weeks. Decisions on applications for over £15,000 take 12 weeks.

Barclays Community Football Fund and the Sported Foundation

Grants of £500 or £2,000 to make playing football more accessible at grassroots level for under-represented groups, including girls, young people from disadvantaged backgrounds and young people with a disability.

Community organisations that are keen to offer football and want to expand their existing provision to new audiences, as well as organisations that are already delivering football to under-represented groups are encouraged to apply.

The Central Social and Recreational Trust aims to improve the conditions of boys and girls in England under the age of 21 and of all other persons by reasons of their poverty who would otherwise be unable to obtain facilities for recreational or other leisure time occupations.

They can help fund equipment, maintenance of properties, training. Grants up to £1,000 and applications can be made any time.

The Coral Samuel Charitable Trust

Grants generally up to £5,000 are available to UK registered charities for general charitable purposes, with a preference for supporting charities working in the areas of animal welfare, education, culture, medical causes and social welfare. A family-based grant-making charity, it's often regarded a generalist grant-maker with the ability to award to a wide range of charitable causes, it tends to demonstrate a preference for supporting UK registered charities working in the areas of:

- o Animal welfare.
- o Education.
- o Culture.
- o Medical causes, and
- o Social welfare.

The Young & Talented Cornwall Creative Writing Award aims to support and encourage young writers in Cornwall, between the ages of 16 and 23. They are especially hoping to support those from disadvantaged and challenging backgrounds. The award will be a mix of both mentoring with an established writer based in Cornwall (face-to-face sessions supported by email contact) and a cash award of up to £1,000 together with a reading award of £150 worth of books. The mentoring support is offered for a period of up to a year.
