We will ONLY be accepting applications for the costs associated with the delivery of projects that are:

- Either Foodbanks or Crisis Funds focused on the relief of poverty caused by the Covid-19 situation
- Run by registered charities in England, Wales, the Isle of Man and the Republic of Ireland
- Entirely for beneficiaries in the above four jurisdictions.

Allchurches Trust: Hope Beyond

The Allchurches Trust Hope Beyond grants programme aims to enable churches and Christian charities to apply for up to £50,000 to meet changing needs within their communities, helping them and the communities they support to adapt to the challenges and opportunities presented by the Coronavirus pandemic. Through the Hope Beyond grants, they aim to fund innovative, impactful projects that will enable people, organisations, and communities to flourish in life after lockdown, building resilience and encouraging hope within these 3 key areas:

- Projects responding to the issues of loneliness and isolation exacerbated by the Coronavirus pandemic where new and/or enhanced support is being proposed. This could include enabling improved accessibility to buildings/activities and measures to ensure buildings are Covid-19 safe.
- Projects focused on growing community resilience and promoting mental and emotional health and wellbeing, including the provision of mental health and wellbeing support groups and 1:1 counselling for people of all ages (including clergy).
- Projects focused on growing technological capability and resilience, particularly increasing digital capacity and provision, and supporting those without online access to get online through training and support.

The Alpkit Foundation are now prioritising their funds to support projects that demonstrate an immediate impact on those affected by the Covid-19 virus crisis. Over £200,000 has been awarded to more than 600 incredible projects so far, with a number of community food schemes supported. This grant is simple to apply for.

Examples include:

- Being active in your local community to help elderly or vulnerable people.

- Minimising the impact of self-isolation for those in quarantine and need access to food, medicines or social care.
- Supporting foodbanks and increasing the number of meals on wheels deliveries to support the elderly.
- Supporting those who are homeless or in temporary accommodation.
- Bringing adventure indoors.
- Projects that encourage responsible and Covid-19 safe outdoor activity.

The Batchworth Trust

Grants of between £5,000 and £45,000 for UK registered charities working in the UK and overseas for a wide range of charitable causes, but in particular for charities working in the areas of medical research, social welfare and support for young people.

The Trust prioritises small charities with innovative projects or that are addressing a critical issue. Please note that the Trust does not maintain a website. Further information is, however, available on the Charity Commission website.

Burg-Wächter Secure Communities Scheme

Burg-Wächter Secure Communities Scheme offers free security kits, up to a value of £150, for properties, equipment, or outdoor areas that are used in service of the community and need extra security at this time. The scheme prioritises grassroots organisations who have limited funds and the most difficulty in meeting extra security costs due to the current situation. Any property, equipment or area that is the responsibility of the local community is relevant, including allotments, sports clubs, village halls, common land or community centres. That means any charity, social enterprise, not for profit, or community venture can apply so long as the security kits will be used locally.

Comic Relief & Paul Hamlyn Foundation: Tech for Good 2021 'Build' programme

One-off grants up to £70,000 for UK not-for-profit organisations or partnerships to develop a digital approach to improving service delivery and impact. Applications that want to adapt or repurpose existing technology to increase impact in their service delivery are also actively encouraged. The programme is suitable for both organisations at concept stage who are at a very early stage of scoping their idea, as well as for those who have already done some digital development. This round will fund up to 18 digital projects with investments of up to £70,000 over a period of nine months. This funding is for a combination of supporting your internal delivery costs as well as contracting support from external digital and technical development agencies. Applications are also invited from partnerships or consortia between multiple not-for-profits that aim to work together to address or improve a service delivery problem in their area of work.

Cornwall Community Foundation Crisis Fund

The Crisis Fund is administered by Cornwall Community Foundation (CCF) and enables charitable organisations to hold a pot of funds to distribute small grants to individuals in crisis.

Charitable organisations reaching people in Crisis can apply for £250 to distribute small amounts, usually £30 or less to a maximum of £90 when there is a need for immediate help, to alleviate destitution or poverty.

Cornwall Community Foundation (CCF) Emergency Fund

If your community group or charity operates in Cornwall or the Isles of Scilly and you are helping people impacted by the Coronavirus crisis, CCF Emergency Fund has grants immediately available to support your vital work.

Each application will be considered on an individual basis, with grant awards ranging from £1,000 to £10,000 (or larger in exceptional circumstances).

Funding is available to meet two strands of community need:

1. Emergency and crisis: for community groups helping people survive during the crisis by supporting their immediate, emergency needs.
2. Build Back Better: for community groups looking beyond immediate crisis provision to develop or reopen services for the future.

The Fund is open to the following organisations:

- Registered charities, including charitable incorporated organisation
- Constituted organisations and non-registered charities
- Special arrangement apply for community interest companies and community benefit societies.
- Churches and other religious organisations (for community support activities only)
- Partnerships or organisations working collaboratively. The lead applicant would need to be one of the above
- Special arrangements apply for large organisations

Cornwall Community Foundation (CCF) Headstart Kernow Young Peoples Mental Wellbeing Legacy Fund

Providing grants to support children and young people aged 10 -16 with their emotional health and mental wellbeing. Open to local community groups, projects and individuals via sponsor agencies to promote resilience and the emotional health and mental wellbeing. (We've listed this also in our separate hardship grants for individuals list). But projects can apply for up to £6,000 per group activity.

An application should make clear how the proposal is linked to at least one of the 5 Ways to Wellbeing:

- Connect
- Be Active (get moving)
- Keep Learning (take time for you)
- Give (give to others)
- Take Notice (stop and take notice).

Cornwall Council Community Chest Crisis Scheme

Cornwall Council Community Chest Crisis Scheme gives grants of up to £1,000 to smaller un-constituted groups who are supporting local communities through the coronavirus crisis. Voluntary Community and Social Enterprise groups that are formally constituted should first apply to access Cornwall Community Foundation's Emergency Fund.

The programme operates across all of Cornwall's 19 Community Network areas, and groups can apply for grants through individual Cornwall councillors.

To apply, simply email your Community Link Officer (CLO) with brief details of your group and the work you're doing. In the email also copy in communitynetworks@cornwall.gov.uk.

The CLO will then contact the relevant Cornwall Councillors to see if they are willing to support your project in principle. Details of the 19 CLOs are on the Community Network Map that can be accessed through the link above.

Coastline Housing is match funding the scheme in the three, main community network areas in which it operates:

- Camborne, Pool, Illogan and Redruth;
- Helston and South Kerrier;
- and parts of Falmouth and Penryn.

This means that community groups in those areas bidding successfully for Community Chest funding would see their cash injection go up by half through the Coastline Housings contribution.

Culture Recovery Fund

Grants to support England's culturally significant organisations which are facing a challenging financial situation as a result of COVID-19 and which have exhausted all other options for increasing their financial resilience.

Grants of between £25,000 and £3 million are available with no matched funding requirement.

Grants averaging £8,700 to UK registered charities for a wide range of charitable causes, in particular charities working with people in need in the areas of the arts, culture, disability, education, end-of-life care, financial hardship, healthcare and patient support, and heritage.

Foyle Foundation Small Grants Scheme

The Foyle Foundation has re-opened its Small Grants Scheme to support smaller, grass-roots and local charities across the UK during the Covid-19 crisis.

Organisations which are currently delivering services to the young, vulnerable, elderly, disadvantaged or the general community either directly or through online support can apply for grants of between £1,000 and £10,000.

Funding can be used to cover core costs or essential equipment, to enable ongoing service provision, homeworking, or delivery of online digital services for charities with a turnover of less than £150,000 per annum that can show financial stability and a clear need for their services. Applications can be submitted at any time.

Music for All – Community Project Grants

Music for All offers grants of up to £2,500 for community groups and schools in the UK to develop community music initiatives. In general, community grants are provided towards the purchase of instruments, associated equipment or for teaching costs.

The National Lottery Community Fund: Local Connections Fund

Grants of between £300 and £2,500 for small local charitable organisations working to bring people and communities together and reduce loneliness and isolation caused by COVID-19.

Funded by The National Lottery Community Fund and the Department for Digital, Culture, Media & Sport, the aim of the Fund is to strengthen and develop small, local community organisations that can connect communities and bring people together in order to reduce loneliness and isolation in the wake of COVID-19.

Grants, which are for between £300 and £2,500 with no matched funding requirement, should be used to enable:

- Individuals to feel supported and less lonely or isolated.
- Organisations to learn from each other
- People and communities to feel more connected, and
- People to be more aware of services available that help them to connect with others and become involved in their community.

Awards can be used for such this as (please note this is not an exclusive list):

- Equipment and materials.
- General project costs.
- Management costs.
- Monitoring and evaluation.
- Networking events/opportunities, including sharing learning and best practice.
- Overheads.
- Small-scale improvements to venues.
- Staff salaries.
- Staff/volunteer training and development, including digital skills.
- Systems improvements, like communications, fundraising, leadership development.
- Volunteer expenses.

The Newby Trust has designated a Special Fund for smaller charities to provide support during the COVID-19 pandemic. Priority will be given to existing and recent grant recipients and to charities working in the areas of homelessness, food supplies, domestic violence, mental health, young people and older people. Grants of up to £5,000 may be made to cover core costs or to fund operational changes made in response to the crisis.

Ocean Housing: Hardship Fund

Ocean Housing's hardship fund supports local community groups, charities, and other voluntary sector organisations which are serving our local communities, and are experiencing unprecedented demand for services at this time. If you are a voluntary organisation, please download and complete the application form from their website using the link above and email it to help@oceanhousing.com

The Ocean Housing hardship fund also provides direct support to people who are tenants of Ocean Housing (see separate entry under grants for individuals) where their needs cannot easily, or immediately, be met and where financial support is required in areas including helping tenants with bills, fuel costs, and supermarket shopping vouchers, where food banks are unable to assist.

Paul Hamlyn Foundation - Covid 19 Support

Paul Hamlyn Foundation have reopened applications to their Covid-19 support fund as of the 30th of October 2020. They have a £20 million emergency fund, and have already made over 350 grants totalling £11 million. They are still prioritising organisations that they have an existing funding relationship with and state that *'Awards through the Emergency Fund are continuing. This is not an open application fund and you will need a PHF grants manager to support your case.'* See their website for more details

***Paul Hamlyn Foundation Youth Fund**

The Youth Fund supports organisations whose main purpose is working with and for young people (aged 14-25) who face complex transitions to adulthood.

Through the Covid-19 crisis we have been made increasingly aware that inequality plays out in ways that connect and intersect across race, gender, class, disability and other characteristics. The pandemic is having a disproportionate impact on young people.

The Youth Fund will support:

- Core operating costs (organisations can request up to £90,000, spread over three years (max £30,000 per year).

- Organisations which provide direct services or infrastructure support

The Sylvia Waddilove Foundation UK COVID-19 Emergency Fund

The Foundation has set up an emergency fund to help small to medium sized organisations who are struggling to manage the financial impact of COVID-19 either because of increased demand for their services or loss of income. The fund is targeted at organisations in a critical position. Applications must be a charity, CIC, or registered society with an income of no more than £500,000 and have free reserves of no more than £100,000. The application must relate to the financial impact of COVID-19, starting no earlier than 1st March 2020.

The organisation must operate in one of the following categories:

- Education relating to non-domestic animals (this includes animal husbandry, veterinary science, animal welfare and surgery, and organic farming).
- Visual and performing arts.
- Medical research.
- The relief of disability or severe illness.
- The accommodation of those in need.

The Volant Trust: COVID-19 Response Fund

The Volant Trust accepts applications from registered charities, community interest companies, community organisations and social enterprises in the UK and internationally that demonstrate a strong focus on alleviating social deprivation and helping vulnerable groups who have been particularly impacted by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Funding is available for project and administrative costs although applications for medical equipment and the production or distribution of PPE will also be considered.

* To receive a decision by October 2021 applications must be submitted between 1st January and 31st July 2021.

Youth Covid Support Fund:

Grassroots youth clubs, uniformed youth groups, and national youth and umbrella organisations based in England, including registered charities as well as incorporated Community Interest Companies and not-for-profit organisations can apply for retrospective grants up to £250,000 for local youth organisations in England to ensure youth services can continue to survive and operate.

This is a new revenue grant programme designed to enable local and national youth organisation in England that can demonstrate a track record of delivery and have had to either scale back or close their services as a result of COVID-19. Grants are available for costs incurred between 1 November 2020 and 31 March 2021. Grants, which must be spent by Wednesday 31 March 2021, can be applied retrospectively to eligible expenses already incurred during this period, providing they haven't been funded by another external source, and may include (please note this is not an exclusive list):

- o Core staffing costs (including casual workers) that cannot be met elsewhere by other government funds (for example, the Furlough scheme).
- o Equipment (which is not capitalised) to ensure compliance with public health requirements.

- o Facility or equipment hire.
- o Insurances.
- o Rent.
- o Retaining essential skills and expertise, and
- o Utility costs.

AllChurches Trust Ltd supports projects run by churches of many denominations and Christian organisations. Their primary charitable objective is to promote the Christian faith or any other charitable purpose.

The Trust focuses on building communities, helping people to flourish, and growing churches.

Their grants normally fund capital projects and equipment and not salaries or running costs. They only fund projects in the UK and Ireland. They give grants to churches of many denominations, so long as they are members of Churches Together in England (CTE), Action of Churches Together in Scotland (ACTS), Churches Together in Wales (Cytun), the Irish Council of Churches or a local 'churches together' group. All applicants, including education establishments, need to be a UK registered charity, church or have "exempt" status.

The Alliance Family Foundation

Grants for UK registered charities for a wide range of charitable causes, with a preference for projects that focus on education, the relief of poverty and religious activities in England, Wales, Israel and the USA.

The Anchor Foundation offers grants for Christian charities who are working to address social exclusion with a particular interest in charities working within healing and the arts. The Foundation only supports registered charities and offers grants in the range of £500 to £10,000. The Anchor Foundation cannot enter into correspondence about individual applications or pre-application support.

The Andrew Anderson Trust

Provide small grants of £1,000 or less for UK registered charities working in the areas of religious activities, education and training, health and sickness, and overseas aid. The Trust's main area of grant support is evangelical organisations and churches. Individuals are also regularly grant aided.

Grants vary from £250 to £3,000. They prioritise organisations working in areas of high unemployment/deprivation and favour charities who make good use of volunteers. Trustees meet twice a year.

The Bishop Radford Trust

The Bishop Radford Trust is a charity which supports Christian ministry in the UK and internationally. They offer grants of up to £5,000 for UK registered charities to support the work of the Christian church in the UK and internationally. Larger grants of £15,000 are available for organisations that have already received a grant from the trust. They fund those who aim to promote the work of the Christian church following the principles of the Church of England in undertaking church related projects promoting charitable purposes, the education of priests, future priests and church workers, and to support Church Ministry.

Childs Charitable Trust

The Childs Charitable Trust is a grant-making trust, supporting Christian UK registered charities and organisations working both in the UK and overseas.

Projects will be considered that fall into the following categories:

- Youth - the trust looks to support projects working in schools and with vulnerable and disengaged young people in the UK. Supported activities may include RE Lessons; School Assemblies; Lunchtime/After school clubs; Evangelism; Personal Development Programmes; Homelessness Prevention.
- Outreach - the trust works to share the gospel of Christ by supporting all aspects of Christian outreach both in the UK and overseas and can fund, for example, Church Plants; Overseas Mission; Training in Evangelism; Chaplaincy.
- Society - the trust believes people of faith bring a valuable contribution to social action and justice and support initiatives that have a positive impact in their society. Grants could support, for example: Counselling; night shelters; alcohol/drug rehabilitation; homelessness; or prison/ex-offenders work.
- Education - the trust supports initiatives involved in all areas of Christian education including Bible Translation; Media Initiatives; Bible Colleges; Literature; Apologetics.

The trustees can't guarantee to fund all applicants, but will give prayerful consideration to every request they receive and aim to meet monthly to discuss applications.
