Notes from Feeding Bradford & Keighley Network Meeting 6th July 2020, 1.30pm, via Zoom



2020/05 Welcome, Apologies and Introductions

About 30 people attended the meeting. Names can be provided on request.

Cathy welcomed everybody to the meeting and everybody introduced themselves and their work / organisation.

2020/06 How has your work changed in the last 3 months?

Bingley Foodbank: About 3x what they would normally do, have links with local schools and are also sharing excess food.

Scholemoor Beacon: Delivering packed lunches to 33 families, over 1000 meals in the last 3 months. Now delivering packs of food for people to make their own lunches. Very positive move forward, well received.

Sandale Trust: Very busy last week, 83 food parcels. Plus 100 packed lunches, 200 breakfasts, 120 meals per day. Quieter week before, about half those numbers.

Girlington Community Centre: Centre provided meals 2x per week, in partnership with Morrison's, but this is finished now. Advice etc services by telephone.

Bradford Metropolitan Foodbank: Now have appointment system for people to pack / collect. Demand slightly reduced in last 2 weeks, looking how to move forward to deal with increased demand.

Immanuel Project: Put on an extra day (Friday) during the crisis. Takeaways at lunchtime only, Fridays now stopped. Supported by Council staff plus HOP team. Moving premises shortly, they will be closed for about 3 weeks.

Gateway Centre: Delivered meals, demand has now gone down. Doing evening meals now too, plus packed lunches on Friday for collection. Education packs delivered too, Bradford-wide to 235 children. Served around 1600 hot meals so far. Sending out cookery packs too, and people send back pictures of what they cooked. Running mini markets too, 2-3 times per week. See also https://youtu.be/aubzrWUnDzA

Bingley Community Kitchen: New community kitchen (in a school) providing takeaway meals. School closed so were able to provide this service.

TLG: Managing the distribution of the DfE grants. School holidays starting in 2 weeks

Idle Foodbank: Picked up families through schools, support about 20 families who don't fit foodbank criteria

St John's Great Horton: Weekly drop-in foodbank. Supported by Inn Churches and other agencies, also sourcing hygiene products. At start of lockdown about 30-40 families, now about 90-120 per week. Signposting

Parish of Girlington, Heaton & Manningham: Drop-in meal on Fridays moved to takeaway. Exponential increase over last 3 weeks. Also increase in existing relationships in parish, people needing parcels

Bevan House: Doctors' surgery & wellbeing centre for vulnerable groups. During lockdown made sure people had basic needs, eg medication, food. Patients across Bradford. Signposting. Have little food store mainly used for people who self-isolated and had nobody. Also sent out activity /education packs.

Feeding Britain: Supporting emergency programmes by regional partners, coordinating funding and food supplies, sustaining programmes for families that are eligible for free school meals. Also activity packs. Shift in focus to more sustainable offering, projects that will help to deal with long-term demand rather than emergency response

Council, Bradford East: Have been supporting voluntary organisations. Moving on to socially distanced street-based activities. There are lots of mentally vulnerable and isolated people

Wellsprings Together: Host organisation for Cathy (Feeding Bradford). Supporting in a variety of ways, including through church responses, also supporting with the Healthy Holidays coordination.

Communityworks: Opened foodbank to respond to local need. Mostly collection, some delivery. Partnership with FareShare and Morrison's. Also creative packs for children and elderly. Telephoning.

Salvation Army Keighley: Concentrating on foodbank work, 4 foodbanks in Keighley under the same referral system. At height of crisis 4-5 x normal demand, about 1500 food parcels since lockdown, normally 1100 per year. Demand decreasing over last few weeks. Discussions about sustainable affordable food.

Good Shepherd Centre Keighley: Normally don't do food but supported about 30 families through lockdown. Donations from various places. Also clothes bank and furniture. Hoping to reopen centre partially this week.

Inn Churches Storehouse: In partnership with Council, Feeding Britain, Feeding Bradford, FareShare. Supplied about 250,000 meals or ingredients for those meals to foodbanks, in addition to work with feeding projects. Sent out 225 parcels for Healthy Holidays, containing videos, project bags etc and about 1 tonne of food. Massively supported by FareShare, Feeding Britain. All food distributed to foodbanks was enhanced (up to end June) by about 25% by Feeding Britain/Bradford. Feeding Britain also pledged £10,000 per month until end September. Social supermarket opening later this month, also community café.

FareShare: Increase since start of Covid: in BD about 91 tonnes of food provided, mainly to Inn Churches, approx £148,000 value. Starting to see a slowdown now. Working with DEFRA to ensure food is coming through to FareShare nationally until the end of September, this will reduce then. DEFRA insist on stock being distributed within 2 weeks of arriving. FareShare's fee has been waived for all organisations until end September. Built strong infrastructure that can be stepped up again. Last year distributed about 1200 tonnes in the year, this year (projected) 3600 tonnes.

BD Council Public Health: busy with Covid response. Looking at wider determinants of food insecurity and accessibility to food in the longer term that will feed into a strategy.

Peak Tuition Academy: not normally distributing food, but working with children of families facing financial hardship, so ended up distributing food. Looks like families will be struggling for a while.

Womenzone Community Centre: providing activity packs through the Healthy Holiday provision, including equipment for sports, arts & crafts, food vouchers. Finding that food parcels provided by foodbanks are often not culturally appropriate and are looking for funding to provide culturally appropriate food.

Cathy extended **thanks and congratulations** from Feeding Bradford to all for the hard work and what they have and still are achieving in the very difficult circumstance we found ourselves in.

2020/07 Feeding Bradford & Keighley

The Keighley group officially joined the Feeding Bradford Network, this is reflected in the name change and updated logo. There were no objections to changing documents like the Constitution to reflect this new name.

2020/08 Project Updates

2020/08.1 Healthy Holidays

Cathy is working with Leeds Community Foundation about the funding of about 40 organisations for Healthy Holidays Covid Response projects. It was seen as more important to fund organisations immediately rather than wait for the summer holidays. Some focused on food, some on activities, many a mixture of the two.

TLG are funding about 92 organisations, for the summer holiday with money from the Department of Education there is an approximate 60/30 split between schools and community organisations.

Holiday projects are normally getting children together for activities, and TLG gave projects the opportunity to say what they were planning on doing in "normal" circumstances and in social distancing. Schools said they can operate well in social distancing, but people are nervous about sending their children.

Most non-school organisations have said that they will send home packs for children, to include food and activities to enjoy with their families.

Some organisations are running activities, working with appointment systems and / or smaller groups.

2020/08.2 Pathways out of Poverty (Advice Worker in Food Settings)

The Advice Worker is working from home. Leaflets about this advice service were put into food bags from lots of foodbanks. The service is going well, there has been a positive response. Other advice providers are still offering advice mostly by phone.

2020/08.3 Foodbank Work

CH shared a graph of how the foodbank work developed throughout the crisis. As a baseline, about 4000 people / days fed prior to the crisis. This tripled at the height of the crisis. Levelling down now, but still at least double of what it used to be. Foodbanks struggled to purchase supplies because of supply restrictions from supermarkets this is now resolved. The council have been funding food for the food banks during this crisis, we are waiting for decisions on this funding to the end of the year.

2020/08.4 Street Kitchens

Meal providers mainly moved to takeaways and a delivery system, some closed down. Feeding Bradford and others collected clients' data for home delivery. This gave them the opportunity to find out which support they needed. The ambition is to link up more support services. More meal providers are reopening now.

Most homeless people were housed over the crisis, but other people were struggling financially and with isolation.

2020/09 Survey

We received 37 replies so far and will send this survey out again to some other providers. The survey results are attached to the end of this report and are also available from our website <u>https://wellspringstogether.org.uk/resources</u>

There was a spread of organisations who responded, faith and community based and statutory organisations.

The most important request was to support low cost food.

2020/10 Low Cost Food

Keighley is exploring models for low cost food provision. Low cost food is more sustainable and dignified.

In Bradford, there will be some mapping. The Council is supportive of low cost food provision.

The social supermarket run by Inn Churches is due to open in about 2 weeks' time, but is open to referrals now. It does not serve a specific geographical area, it is located in the old Bradford Brewery, near Westgate in the City Centre. It will be run on a membership basis, and members will also be able to access advice on nutrition, cookery lessons etc.

2020/11 Food Strategy for Bradford

In the short term, Bradford Council is supporting food provision up to the end of the financial year. They acknowledged that a sustainable food strategy is needed, and are also partnering with Keighley.

Council inviting people to get together to decide on the long term plan, these will include people from Mosques, Gurdwaras etc. Also need to think about strengths - businesses, communities, allotments etc. thinking how to link these. Also Born in Bradford group want to get involved.

Hoping to set up face to face meetings to find out what people need. There will be consideration for culturally and socially sensitive food, and also for healthy food.

Shanaz will be part of the process and pulling some mapping together to look at food in broadest sense.

This plan / report will be focused on action; it is not just a paper exercise.

2020/12 Any Other Business

2020/12.1 Future Situation

Concern about the future situation as the furlough scheme is ending, and the prediction is that the GDP will be hit by this and Brexit. There might be lots more vulnerable people, and the fear is that there will be Council cuts, rising food prices, leading to massive problems.

The Council agrees and is concerned about this. They feel that, by working together, organisations will be more able to pick up people that need support and then support them. We need to make sure we reach out as widely as possible and make sure people are not falling through the gaps. Bradford is good at working together and has a good voluntary sector.

2020/12.2 Select Committee Report

The Select Committee Report was published this morning. A lot of the report is about Covid, lots on food insecurity, poverty, access to food. FareShare Yorkshire submitted evidence for this report. 2020/12.3 Potential New Food Hub with The Real Junk Food Project

Fountains Church in the centre of Bradford is looking at potentially including a food option, social enterprise etc. They might work with The Real Junk Food Project on this. However, there is nothing definite about this yet.

2020/13 Date of Next Meeting


The next Feeding Bradford network will be towards the end of October, this will be our AGM. If we have a physical meeting, it would be good to have that in Keighley. Details TBC.



When they get 'Leave to Remain' we support them to find ongoing accommodation if they wish to remain in the area. Our congregation contributes a small amount to help augment their meagre weekly income. We work with the Salvation Army and the Good Shepherd Centre







- We have a good network in BD6 of different organisations with different offers/specialisation working together. The problem comes for another organisation, not local, that claims working also for our area without any coordination with what our organisations do in BD6, and requesting people already in need to travel to them to get help, when we have local points of help in walking distance all over BD6, with possibilities of many other services that they could find here if they were sent to us.
- Insufficient appropriate information; confusing postcode restrictions on help
- The last question was difficult to answer we have a wide range of clients with a wide range of needs. Some of their greatest need is affordable food etc. I'm not sure how to answer that question to be honest.
- Food hubs and community centres need to help each other more they only seem to want to get help for there project
- Neighbourhood service links in well with VCS organisations who provide local services in neighbourhoods across the district. We often support their provision with funding, resources, staff or help them develop ideas for projects or services that respond to needs.
- If we can't help we can usually find where people can go for help.
- Through referring people on to partner agencies
- A definite 'maybe', depending on how it is organised.
- Really value the voluntary sector and community resources to provide vital support
- Only to a limited extent
- Not always
- For now yes but there needs to be much more investment in local community support initiatives

- There is very limited support for people to be able to access benefits which leads to people getting more and more into debt. Our fear is that this will only increase as a result of the shut down and the loss of low level jobs. We would very much like to be able to support volunteers to befriend and support those who are trying to manage their debt, through attending classes for managing on a budget. Being engaged with all the primary schools in Keighley, we know there is extensive food poverty, so holiday clubs which include food provision is something that we see is a real need in Keighley.
- An entitlement to affordable housing with minimum standards.
- More partnership working across Bradford is needed and more out of school provision is needed through providing activity packs to everyone that is on a low income, isolated and vulnerable (especially the elderly).
- Giving the families the opportunity to access anything to do with food and holiday provisions is a great tool. We have work with families over the past 6 yrs. We have found this works and brings community's together. Getting the family working together as a whole has some rewarding out comes. The whole learning together has some really great outcomes and keeps children focused and parents not feeling isolated. Working with the community going forward, I can see families able to do all we have done before but through social media, doing a lot more. Through providing cooking bags, recipes, activity packs, sports packs, getting the community involved with sending video's and photo's of what they have cook, having competitions to make it more enjoyable. As we are unsure how long it will be before we could do this in the centre. I feel this would be a great way forward for know and it would mean family's still have that connection that we have built up over the years.
- Teach people how to cook; provide them with the basic ingredients and invite professional cooks in the district to give of their time and knowledge/expertise.
- better support to enable those experiencing crisis to get out of that situation
- Sorry, I only have a Keighley perspective and that is still developing as I've not even been here a year yet, but this is as I see it for Keighley in particular.
- many people would like to learn how to cook on a budget, but can not get out to join a class. I would like to
 get some funding to make a cd that people can watch and play at home to learn how to make easy low cost
 healthy meals that can be given out free of charge to families and people who are getting food from the food
 bank and who are on a low income (including older people)
- Pay as you feel markets need to focus on healthy choices and no unhealthy snacks and drinks. -Additional 'top up' provision (whether prepared meals, food parcels/food banks, etc.) needs to focus on only healthy meals/foods not unhealthy food, snacks and drinks. These are suggested as a possible mechanism to reduce dependence on fatty sugary foods and snacks

Holiday and Out of School food provision

- We already offer social and housing advice, in partnership with CHAS and Incommunities, mental health support for isolated elderly men in partnership with SHED, drug addiction support in partnership with New Direction, and are working with other churches/organisations around who offer different other services for food provision and help. I think that we our area is already well covered. We are also involved in a CAP Debt Centre and CAP Life Skills which will run in a larger area than just BD6 with a greater circle of churches participating to this.
- outreach advice on welfare benefits, debt, housing, immigration, employment
- TGSC is already working with other providers in the Town
- Free advice sector is being cut in Bradford, we need to make sure this does continue to support local families, confidential place to talk through whats going wrong. Holidays I would say all year round funding to build relationships with families struggling through schools and community centres showing they are their to support people getting back on their feet no matter what is causing the issues
- We are already co-ordinating help for Asylum Seekers/ refugees an develop the service as needs arise there's always something happening that you hadn't expected!
- We are a small player in this supporting 20 people a day on average with a drink and sandwiches and safe space and toilets
- More holiday and out of school provision that we have been providing over the last few years.
- I haven't thought this through, yet, but the obvious one, to me, would be providing the food for others to learn to cook
- Would be great to link in with voluntary service groups to provide co-ordinated approach to health and wellbeing in psychoeducation and skills based approaches and in getting people involved in planning projects and contributing to what they think should happen for their local community an for Bradford as a whole
- We could offer activities for families in holidays and advice support families try solve their debt/cash flow problems
- Advice and casework and representation where necessary
- maybe this could be part of an Innovation which we are part of commissioning
- We would like to continue providing food based support for children in the holidays, but I don't think this is the most important need in the district (but it is one of them)
- Help with managing finances
- One-one support, group, skills building, employability, empowerment and distribution of food parcel to people in need.
- More holiday clubs feeding children
- we can help with extending our food bank service and would be interested in supporting people with making low cost meals.
- Happy to help run PAYF food markets, or get involved in decisions re future food provision
- Both
- Early Help provides general support in all areas and then signpost or refer
- Happy to look into cooperative/ peoples super market type venture.

- we work with a cross section of the community and would like to do more
- We would like to continue to provide meals and activity to children, young people and families in school holidays
- Holiday activities
- CBMDC -can co-ordinate and support
- Working in partnership with other organisations to create activity packs for families, elderly etc instead of everyone jumping on the band wagon and applying for the same pot of funding to distribute activity packs - all communities have different needs so consideration needs to be given to ethnicity, language barriers, cultural barriesr etc.

- Identifying and visiting the most isolated and deprived
- We would like to have support with people providing food at the times we run holiday clubs. we are already running the debt centre and life skills programmes so we would like to link in to a referral system to ensure people know about the programmes

They dare not speak out both from mistrust of officials and fear of reprisals (ingrained in them by previous life and which they thought they were escaping here).
- Better co-ordination of what is already on offer and collaborative working and sharing of available resources, including staffing, transport, volunteers and buildings.
- Sustainability and widening out and empowering people is really important
- Think The Unthinkable. Then do It is the sign in our office. It works for us.
- Really like the idea of helping people build new skills and be involved from the start, think its a very relevant point about accessing food parcels and effect on dignity and self esteem
- to be able to offer the holiday we need to know early if funding is available and time to build personal links with the schools and families throughout the year to make sure we are supporting the most vulnerable families and that they trust us.
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- Voluntary and statutory agencies working together for a more streamlined service.
- Many callers to our emergency hot food helpline are struggling with insufficient benefits eg Universal credit is just not enough for them to live on.
- Too much inequality and lack of inclusion
- There seems to be an opportunity to educate families as a whole through fun, practical cooking sessions that promotes better intergenerational relationships and family bonding whilst supporting knowledge development of local provision and skill sharing for managing on a budget.
