### **TRANSFORMING**

- Helping enthuse and encourage churches including their leaders and congregations - to engage with their local communities and become involved with social justice issues.
- Connecting people, organisations, ideas and resources through one-to-one meetings and communications, networks and events.
- Equipping people to engage in social action with greater confidence and skills, through training, talks or sharing examples of best practice.
- Providing 'infrastructural' support eg. with accessing funding, planning building projects.

The trustees of TPT are made up of church and community leaders in Plymouth, along with a representative from Church Urban Fund.



### **About us**

Transforming Plymouth Together (TPT) aims to address issues related to poverty and inequality which matter to the people of Plymouth, through informal community work and community development initiatives.

TPT was launched in April 2016 as a direct church response to the 2014 'Plymouth Fairness Commission Report'. Working together with local churches, other faith groups, the third sector, statutory bodies and businesses, TPT works across the city, carrying forward the work of the Commission which identified these key issues:

- the need to strengthen local communities
- individual and family well-being
- discrimination of young people / young adults
- the escalating cost of living
- the need to strengthen the local economy
- housing
- implications of an ageing population

### **Developing the project**

After an extensive period of listening to church leaders and communities, six key themes were identified which could support existing ministries and increase the capacity of local churches to get involved and make a difference:

Social Isolation • Financial Resilience

**Migrant Vulnerability • Child Poverty** 

Health Inequality
Modern Slavery

During the year, TPT has acheived a number of activities to address these issues, such as:

- Raising Dementia Awareness, which has resulted in a number of churches becoming 'Dementia Friendly' - and a successful dementia-friendly carol service was held in 2016.
- Working with CTiP and ROC Care Plymouth to befriend isolated people in their own homes.
- Various Plymouth churches have worked alongside organisations working with refugees; this included the Lampedusa 'walk of witness'.
- As part of Financial Resilience for Churches and Communities, TPT and Transformation Cornwall held a 'Meet the Funders' session that was attended by over 100 people followed up with training for churches on writing bids.TPT also inked with the local Credit Union and are taking part in the 'Just Finance' project called Cash Smart, Credit Savvy.
- Working with churches and charities such as the local Food Bank, Plymouth Soup Run and Shekinah Mission to help address child poverty.
- Raising awareness and addressing the problem of Modern Slavery.
- Other activities have included setting up a Plymouth group as part of the National Parenting Initiative, and exploring ways in which Plymouth Churches can work with local voluntary and social enterprises.
